We have a full line up of dynamic guest ministers this season from around New England. I look forward to seeing all of you Sundays this summer to share in St. Andrew's ministry in the community.



Summertime Exercise Routine



"How can I get more faith?" I have heard this question many times talking with people who are following God. The question, while coming from a place of honest seeking, is a little off the mark. We tend to turn almost everything into a commodity that one can accumulate or lose. Faith is not a commodity.

You cannot get "more" faith or "less" faith. The image that illustrates this well is that of our mind, body, and soul. We have the mind that we have, and we can strengthen it, but we cannot get more mind. The same goes with our body. Even though some speak of getting "more" muscles the fact is that we have the muscles we have, and we can exercise them to strengthen them, or we can leave them to atrophy. The same is true for our faith. It, too, needs exercise to be healthy.

Frederick Buechner says this about faith. "Faith is better understood as a verb than a noun, as a process than a possession. It is on-again-off-again rather than onceand-for-all. Faith is not being sure where you are going but going anyway. It is a journey without maps."

This notion that faith is a verb, and a process leads us away from the idea we need "more" faith and into a posture that we need to exercise the faith that we have. The Good News is that God gave each of us all the faith we need. The challenge is that it is up to us to use it wisely.

Summertime is almost upon us, and the roads are full of people exercising their muscles. I encourage you to take time this season to exercise your faith.

Junior Warden's Report

St. Andrew's chapel came through this past winter with aplomb and grace. The transition of knowledge and teamwork of the Junior Warden Emeritus and the newly minted Junior Warden proved to be up to the task. The work to open the chapel and kickoff Spring with an early May wedding and memorial service has the building ready for visitors and our summer season. The lychgate restoration project, completed last Autumn, looks great and is a testament to the conscientious maintenance performed by the various committees and their cadre of skilled tradesmen. Updates to the electrical panel are planned to ensure easier use and better organization. The repointing of the outside stone walls will enter its second phase this year, taking advantage of the temperate weather we enjoy in late Spring and early Autumn. The re-pointing project is being partially funded by a grant from New Hampshire Land and Community Heritage Investment Program (LCHIP). It has been largely through the hard work of the various committees and key individuals that a wide array of preservation efforts have been brought to fruition.


Outreach Throughout our Community

The Outreach Committee will work together again in 2023 to make recommendations for supporting organizations that continue making positive impacts throughout our communities.




Planning a Baptism

Treasurer's Report

As we approach our 147th year of worship and celebration, our finances are in good order. In 2022 we were able to operate within our budgeted means while increasing our outreach support by an additional \$5,000 over 2021. We are grateful to all our benefactors for providing the funds necessary to care for our Chapel.

Our endowment funds, professionally managed by the Diocese directed investment manager, experienced a decline in 2022 in line with the general market downturn. As a result, our 2023 endowment income we be lower this year. We have taken this into account for this year's operating budget. While the financial markets may remain choppy in 2023, we are pleased to have had a return to growth in the first quarter of the year.

In the coming years we will undertake some very important projects to both maintain and restore the Chapel. These will be in addition to the stone re-pointing project we will complete this fall. We are gathering the cost estimates now and will review and prioritize the projects at our next strategic planning session.

Our heartfelt thanks to all who so generously support the mission of St. Andrew's by-the Sea.
