

ission Statement

Junior Warden Report

This year we completed work on adding new piers to support the nave floor. This work was completed in January. A new and larger sump pump was added to replace the smaller pump. During the rainy summer months this year the pump had a work out. The middle section on the lychgate wood is beginning to rot. We have contracted with our carpenter to replace this failing wood. The new wood will be purchased, milled and painted over the winter. It will be replaced next spring. The lower section of the lychgate was replaced five years ago.



We submitted a grant application to New Hampshire Land and Community Heritage Investment Program (LCHIP) to repair the failing mortar on the chapel walls. We are requesting a grant of \$32,000 from LCHIP. Total cost of the project is \$76,000.

Treasurer's Report

Our 145th year saw the chapel come to life again with wonderful worship, wedding and baptism celebrations, and glorious summer music. Thanks to the generosity of all who attend and support St. Andrew's we continue in a solid financial position. Approaching the re-opening season, we budgeted accordingly for the Covid-19 related changes we needed to implement. I am pleased to report that while we have not yet returned to a pre-Covid state, our operating metrics in terms of income and expenses are in line with our budget.

On the endowment side, our funds managed by the Diocese directed investment manager has produced another year of strong gains. The decision to move our endowment accounts to the Diocese in 2019 has proven to be a wise decision. Similarly, our smaller investment reserve accounts held at Vanguard in highly rated, low-cost mutual funds, have appreciated solidly during a lengthy period of rising equity markets.

We are grateful to all within the extended St. Andrew's community who generously support our mission of maintaining a beautiful chapel for worship, celebration, and offering outreach support to our community.
